

## TEAM JUSTICE MINUTES - AMENDED

July 7, 2006

**I. Approval of Team Justice Minutes from the 6/2/06 Meeting – ACTION ITEM: Shawna Mobley moved, Marilyn Cook seconded, the remaining members agreed and the motion carried to approve the 6/2/06 Team Justice Minutes, as submitted.**

**II. Presentation of Plaque to John Green** – Karen Langston presented a plaque to John Green in appreciation for his service on the Team Justice Juvenile Corrections Advisory Board since 2001. Karen welcomed Undersheriff Hinshaw, Denise Wren and Kathy Dittmer to the Board who are replacing John Green, Ralph Teran and Pat Beckemeyer, respectively.

**III. Approve SFY07 – 1<sup>st</sup> Quarter Budget Adjustment Requests** – Chris Morales reported that Juvenile Field Services (JFS) is requesting to move \$200,098 from the Juvenile Intensive Supervision Program (JISP) budget to the Juvenile Case Management (JCM) budget. As of July 1, 2006, JFS staff will share caseloads for JISP and JCM clients. JFS is requesting to use a new cost allocation method attributing 80% of costs to JCM and 20% of costs to JISP. Client specific expenses will be charged 100% to the program the client is served by. Budget adjustment requests that involve moving funds between programs require approval from Team Justice and the Board of County Commissioners prior to the request being submitted to the Juvenile Justice Authority. **ACTION ITEM: Following discussion, Ron Terzian moved, Shawna Mobley seconded, the remaining members agreed and the motion carried to approve the SFY07 first quarter budget adjustment requests, as submitted.**

**Off Agenda Item** – Terri Patterson provided the following updates:

- JFS staff will be trained to use the Youth Level of Services/Case Management Inventory (YLS/CMI) instrument which will be adopted this fall. YLS/CMI is a science-based tool used to assess the level of supervision needed by clients.
- The Juvenile Justice Authority has issued standards for Community Case Management and Juvenile Intensive Supervision Program agencies. Juvenile Field Services policies will be reviewed to ensure they are in compliance with the standards by January 1, 2007.

**IV. Juvenile Justice Parental Modeling Grant** – Chris Morales announced that the 18<sup>th</sup> Judicial District was notified by the Juvenile Justice Authority (JJA) of the availability of \$750,000 (statewide) to fund model prevention programs related to parental modeling and family preservation. JJA anticipates 5 – 10 awards of \$75,000 - \$150,000 across the state. The programs must be evidence based (included in the Office of Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention Model Program Guide) and Medicaid reimbursable. Sedgwick County is the eligible applicant for this funding; however, sub-grants can be made to local agencies. Grant applications are due to JJA on August 15, 2006, and the funding period is

September 1, 2006, to June 30, 2007. Marilyn Cook provided information on the requirements for Medicaid reimbursement. Jean Hogan mentioned that information on the Medicaid State Plan is available on the SRS website at [www.srskansas.org](http://www.srskansas.org). **By general consensus**, members agreed to direct the Team Justice Advisory Sub-Committee to hear from agencies interested in the grant at their meeting on July 11<sup>th</sup>. The Executive Committee will then meet to consider the proposals.

- V. Disproportionate Minority Contact (DMC) Update** – Paulette Goines, Self-Help Network, provided information on the results of recent events in the Latino community as detailed in the DMC report included in the handouts. Representatives from La Mesa Redonda will take proposed strategies to address DMC in the Latino community to its coalition on Saturday, July 15, 2006. The coalition will review the strategies and develop action steps for the strategies, resulting in a plan of implementation. Brian Black will be asked to provide a report on the African American coalition that has formed.

Mark Masterson reported that he is mandated to attend the National Conference on DMC in New Orleans on September 7 – 10, 2006. This year the conference topic is “Law Enforcement for Reducing Racial Disparities and Disproportionate Minority Contact in Juvenile Justice.” Terri Moses, Brian Black, Dr. Craig-Moreland, and an additional person from the Self-Help Network, La Mesa Redonda or a law enforcement agency may also attend.

Mark Masterson announced that the application for the third year of funding for the DMC Pilot Project was revised to remove the \$97,000 for the case management component provided by the Detention Advocacy Services program because JJA ruled it was supplanting. The application was resubmitted with a \$20,000 request to fund strategies from community mobilization meetings.

- VI. Montana Meth Project** – Debbie Donaldson shared a video on the Montana Meth Project with information on Montana’s statewide advertising campaign featuring their “Not Even Once” slogan targeted at preventing 12 – 17 year olds from first time use of methamphetamines. Debbie will update the Board in September on the efforts to find parties interested in implementing a similar advertising campaign in Kansas. Debbie mentioned that solid data on methamphetamine use in Kansas is not readily available.

Jean Hogan announced that the 2<sup>nd</sup> Annual Kansas Alliance for Drug Endangered Children State Conference will be held on Wednesday, August 23, 2006, at the Sedgwick County Zoo. The Kansas Methamphetamine Prevention Project in Topeka provides training on a variety of topics related to methamphetamine use and manufacture.
