

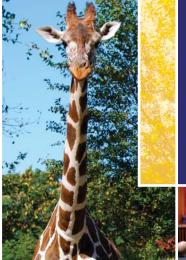

Manager's MESSAGE

Honorable Board of Sedgwick County Commissioners and Citizens of Sedgwick County,

We continue on the journey through ever-changing and challenging times. Last year in preparing the 2011 budget, I shared that the economic challenges in our community and state contributed to financial budgeting challenges for Sedgwick County. But, because of our strategic financial planning and establishing "rainy day" reserves, our organization was better positioned to weather the storm. Unfortunately, the key revenue sources that support so many of our services are either in decline or unstable, including sales tax and investment income. The financial struggles at the state level also have a trickle-down effect to us and impact our ability to sustain services with less state funding.

While we are in a stronger financial position due to our intentional planning, it is for the short term, and not a long-term sustainable approach to funding services. We know we have a "revenue problem," which means we need to reduce expenditures accordingly. We believe this will be our new normal for the next several years as we watch for signs of economic recovery. We have taken a thoughtful, strategic approach to changing course over a period of time, rather than drastic cuts in service or increases in taxes. The resulting budget is a plan for how we will provide and fund services for 2012.

In February 2011, the Board of County Commissioners held its annual retreat to discuss the financial plan and issues that are important to them. At that time, the commissioners provided us with three goals:

Zero deficit by 2013

Smaller government

Reduce debt

With that direction, coupled with our financial constraints, we know that our organization will look different and we will change the way we do business. We developed a two-year process to achieve the zero deficit goal by establishing a \$9 million reduction target for the 2012 budget and an additional \$8 million reduction for 2013. Because we are a service organization, we are dependent on personnel to deliver the needed services to citizens — if we reduce funding for those services, we will in fact be reducing staff or becoming a smaller organization. And, as we continue to review our priorities for spending, we will make determinations of delaying capital projects or using cash to limit debt where we can.

It is my honor and pleasure to work with the employees of Sedgwick County to serve the citizens of Sedgwick County each and every day.

Sedgwick COUNTY

Located in south central Kansas, Sedgwick County was officially established in 1867 and bears the name of Civil War hero Major General John Sedgwick of the Union Army. In 1870, Sedgwick County's first county officials were elected and the city of Wichita was selected to be the county seat. Sedgwick County occupies 1,009 square miles of land and is the second most populous of the 105 counties in Kansas, with an estimated 482,863 residents. Wichita, the largest city in the state of Kansas, is known as the "Air Capital of the World" for its internationally recognized concentration of commercial and military airplane production and aviation services.

The county is governed by a five-member board of county commissioners, which meets in regular session each Wednesday morning. The commissioners, who serve four-year terms, are full-time county officials and perform executive, legislative, and policy related functions. The commissioners also appoint a professional county manager to administer most county functions and to implement policy decisions. Tasks of the county manager range from the management of special projects to the daily functions of the county's more than 3,000 full-time employees.

Mission

Sedgwick County's mission is to assure quality public services that provide for the present and future well-being of citizens. We accomplish this by establishing and maintaining partnerships, encouraging creativity and innovation, ensuring informed decisions, and allocating resources to meet the changing needs of our community.

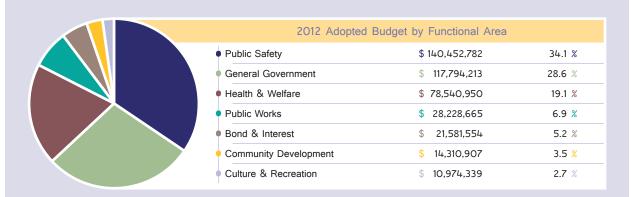

Property TAXES

Property taxes are Sedgwick County's single largest revenue source. Since those taxes are paid in one or two annual installments, they are more noticeable to taxpayers than sales taxes, which are paid in small increments on most purchases.

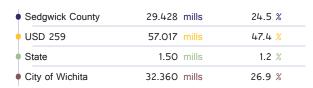

Sedgwick County's levy is only a portion of the total property tax bill. The total tax rate imposed on property in Wichita is 120.305 mills, of which 29.428 mills (24.5 percent) funds Sedgwick County Government. In addition to the numerous services Sedgwick County provides, the 2012 budget includes building, remodeling, and repairing public facilities and infrastructure systems.

The total planned 2012 capital budget is \$33,149,666, a decrease of \$13,274,251 from the 2011 capital budget. Of this amount, \$10.5 million will be funded through the county's operating budget, \$14.7 million through bonds and \$7.9 million through other sources.

2012 Capital Budget Highlights

- Upgrading the emergency communications radio system to 800 MHz and converting it to digital
- Updating the master control and related peripheral technology and replacing kitchen equipment at the adult detention facility
- Together with the Kansas Department of Transportation and other local communities, funding for continued acquisition of right of way for the Northwest Bypass
- Rehabilitating 135th St. from K-42 to 71st St. South
- A joint project with Maize improving Maize Rd. from 45th to 53rd St. North to four lane urban standard with storm sewers, traffic signals, and turn lanes where appropriate

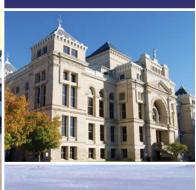
