Common Questions About Trash and Recycling

Where can I dispose of bulky trash?

Bulky trash, such as old furniture, tree limbs, household appliances and electronics, and tires may be taken to one of two trash transfer stations in Sedgwick County. These locations are open to the public. Fees apply and extra fees apply to tires and any appliance with Freon.

What should I do with left over construction and demolition (C&D) waste?

If you've ever remodeled a room in your house, such as a kitchen or bathroom, you likely had a lot of waste that couldn't be used anymore. If you have more waste than will fit in your trash bin, you can take items such as old cabinets, toilets, sinks, sheetrock, etc. to a construction and demolition landfill or a trash transfer station for disposal. These locations are open to the public and fees apply.

Note: commercially generated C&D is not accepted at the trash transfer stations.

What should I do with old paint, motor oil and other materials that can't be thrown away?

The Household Hazardous Waste Facility will accept almost all chemical items from a residential house, such as paint, aerosols, batteries, used oil, gasoline, antifreeze, pesticides, herbicides, garden chemicals, household cleaners, fluorescent bulbs, propane, and old, unwanted medication (no controlled substances). The HHW facility is located at 801 Stillwell in Wichita and is open 9 a.m. to 5:30 p.m. Tuesday to Friday and 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. Saturdays; the facility is closed on Sundays and Mondays.
