Discussion

Judge Fleetwood called the meeting to order. A Quorum was present.

1. Approval of Minutes
 - a. The minutes from 10/25/13 were unanimously approved
2. New Business
 - a. Discussion of Population Report data
 - i. No discussion
 - b. Review of COMCARE resources available for continuum of sanctions



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- i. Presentation by Marilyn Cook and Jason Scheck on the scope of the services offered, where they are, and what is possible in terms of services. *(see attached slides for specific program information)*
- ii. Key Points
 1. There are 27 community health centers in the state. Sedgwick County's health center is the largest in the state. The counties have been grouped into larger regions for purposes of collaboration. We provided 1.4 million dollars in care for uninsured populations last year. We are the health safety net for the area.
 2. COMCARE serves an unduplicated count of 16,000 people each year and 19,000 when counting outpatient and counseling services.
 3. The intake process for adults has changed to same day service shortening the wait time of about a week.
 4. Until the jail mental health pod connection is implemented there is not a robust jail discharge program in place for those not involved in SCOAP. Right now, discharged individuals on medications are on their own to connect with COMCARE. We hope to see progress here in the coming year.
 5. Number of children with serious emotional disturbance (SED) is going up and COMCARE has had to hire therapists to meet the need.
 6. COMCARE is in 18 schools to perform assessments of youth with mental health illness.
 7. COMCARE is funded through the state and the County. There is some out-of-pocket fees and services that are provided to patients backed by some kind of payer, like Medicaid, Medicare, or private insurance.
- c. Sedgwick County Jail Population/Criminal Justice System Study Review
- d. Adding citation in lieu of arrest policy
 - i. Marv Duncan explained that the lead organizations were Wichita PD and the Sheriff's Office
 - ii. Colonel Powell said that there have been some adjustments regarding who is booked for what. As to the significance of those changes he could not say
 - iii. Major Glen Kurtz said that about a year and a half ago Wichita PD became more liberal with cite and release program
 - iv. Judge Fleetwood asked if they give a citation to appear on the scene
 - v. Major Glen Kurts responded in the affirmative
 - vi. Judge Jennifer Jones said it has always been a cite and release jurisdiction. There have been some policy changes. Repeat offenders present a problem because they avoid court and continue to drive. They tend to ignore the fact they were cited by the police so the police are reviewing their policies. Third citations require a minimum 90 in jail.
 - vii. Councilman Alumbaugh asked where we were when this initiative was suggested. Is it possible to show change over time.
 - viii. Judge Fleetwood responded that we would have to go back to the data and try and attribute what caused the change and that might be difficult. He then asked if the Sherrif has addressed any changes to cite and release rather than booking?
 - ix. Colonel Powell said not to his knowledge. He did see on the PD interwatch that they have changed their policy on drive on suspended and now stipulating an automatic booking as of early December 2013.



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- x. Major Glen Kurtz said that instead of trying to put a pin in what caused it we could look at the whole population. Our numbers are much lower today. Arrests have been much lower since 2009—experts are not sure why.
- xi. Judge Fleetwood said that some of it is attributed to cite and release and neighborhood policing. He then asked if the council should review of policy on cite and release.
- xii. Mark suggested that if Monday was the date of the change we could easily collect data and compare it to previous months.
- e. Establish a pilot project drug court
 - i. Marv Duncan explained that he had been to the drug court graduation and that he thinks the recommendation was taken and it has been successful
 - ii. Judge Fleetwood said that the District Court has a successful program as well and that the Supreme Court has a commission to address what steps could be taken to make a more uniform approach across the state.
- f. Establish model program with team of prosecutors, to screen all arrests on a daily basis
 - i. Ann Swegle said that the DAs office has been trying to do this years and they have staff assigned to monitor arrests.
 - ii. Kerrie Platt said that the recommendation was geared toward the City of Wichita
 - iii. Judge Jones said that the City screens domestic violence cases but not for notices to appear because of the volume and because they are not in custody.
 - iv. Judge Fleetwood asked if this is something we want to review again
- 3. Old Business
 - a. No business
- 4. Other Business
 - a. Colonel Powell said on November 15th, 23 deputies graduated from CIT intervention training in preparation of the mental health pod. We anticipate another class of around 25. We now have 115+ inside the jail.
 - b. Judge Fleetwood said there will be a new criminal assignment judge in January. Judge Kisner will replace Judge Wilbert. He also said that we should discuss how to select a new chair for the Council.
 - c. Mark Masterson pointed out that this was Kerrie Platt's last meeting with the CJCC. She will be retiring this month after 25 years of service to Sedgwick County. Her replacement will be Tom Strubel.
- 5. Public Comment
 - a. An unidentified member of the public asked who determines the policies of cite and release. He also asked if we could get more specific data, such as how many drug arrests are specifically marijuana arrests.
 - b. Judge Fleetwood said that relevant agency would determine this, such as Wichita PD or the Sheriff's Department.
 - c. Major Glen Kurts said that it is not possible to get that now because it is classified by category. It is possible to go through each record and determine why the arrest was made but it is not easily accessible at this time.
