On the recommendation of Kristen McGovern, on behalf of Sedgwick County Developmental Disability Organization (SCDDO), Linda Kizzire moved to **approve funding to Cerebral Palsy Research Foundation of Kansas, Inc. in the amount of \$131,323.00 and to Catholic Charities, Inc. in the amount of \$71,211.00.** Tim Kaufman seconded the motion. The motion passed unanimously.

A review committee comprised of Dee Staudt, Jeannette Livingston, Rachel Ryan - SCDDO, Talaya Schwartz - COMCARE, Maggie Flanders - Division of Health and Human Services, and Kristen McGovern - Purchasing evaluated the proposals for content, qualifications, experience and methodology. Both recommended proposals are for day support programs serving individuals who are medically fragile and/or elderly. The programs will increase day support capacity for the medically fragile and/or elderly by 40 individuals.

SCDDO has identified a need to increase service capacity for two key services, residential and day supports, for individuals with intellectual and/or developmental disabilities (I/DD). An important role of the SCDDO is to ensure service capacity. SCDDO is not a direct service provider but works with a network of provider agencies to ensure quality services for individuals with I/DD. Due to a number of different factors impacting the system, the network of providers has been unable to adequately grow to appropriately accommodate the diverse needs of individuals with I/DD in our community. The request for proposal provided funding to assist providers with increasing their service capacity for residential and/or day supports for individuals who are medically fragile/elderly or have interfering behaviors. Agencies were asked to propose projects to increase service capacity with the SCDDO funding up to 40% and the agency providing the other 60%.
