A RESOLUTION AMENDING CHAPTER 19 OF THE SEDGWICK COUNTY CODE, PROVIDING FOR THE ENFORCEMENT OF VARIOUS CODES BY THE DEPARTMENT OF CODE ENFORCEMENT; DEFINING VIOLATIONS AND PROVIDING PENALTIES THEREFOR.

WHEREAS, the Board of County Commissioners, upon study and recommendation of the Sedgwick County staff; and

WHEREAS, THE Board of County Commissioners is authorized and empowered to adopt resolutions pursuant to K.S.A. 19-101(Sixth), K.S.A. 19-212(Thirteenth) and K.S.A. 19-4701 et seq.; and

WHEREAS, the Board of County Commissioners has determined the need to amend Chapter 19, of the *Sedgwick County Code*, and define violations thereof and provide penalties therefor.

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF COUNTY COMMISSIONERS OF SEDGWICK COUNTY, KANSAS, that:

SECTION 1: AMENDMENTS TO CHAPTER 19

1. Chapter 19 of the Sedgwick County Code is amended by the addition of the following sections and shall read as follows:

Section 19-2. Definitions.

The following words, terms and phrases, when used in this article, shall have the meanings ascribed to them in this section, except where the contest clearly indicates a different meaning:

Bulky waste means discarded or stored inoperative household appliances, disused furniture, disused equipment, junk lumber and other building demolition debris, parts of machinery and equipment and similar waste not ordinarily collected with compactor equipment.

County means all of the county other than the land areas within cities.

Inoperable vehicle means any motor vehicle which because of mechanical defects, a wrecked or partially wrecked frame or body or dismantled parts cannot be operated in a normal and safe

manner. Any vehicle which has been inoperative for a period of ten (10) days shall constitute a prima facie presumption that such vehicle is inoperable.

Premises means a lot, plot or parcel of land, including structures located thereon.

Property means any real property within the county which is not a street or highway.

Refuse means all putrescible and nonputrescible waste materials such as trash, debris, garbage, tree trimmings, grass cuttings, dead animals and solid industrial waste, but shall not include human or animal excrement.

Salvage yard means any premises used for:

- (1) Storage or sale or resale of used merchandise;
- (2) The disassembly of wrecked or used automobiles for the reuse or sale of automobile parts; or
- (3) The storage or sale of various kinds of metal or used building materials.

Section 19-3. Activities or conditions prohibited; enumeration. It is unlawful for any person to maintain or to permit to maintain any activity or condition as described in this section.

- (1) Open basement structures, excavations, swimming pools, storm cellars, industrial tanks or other excavations or structures that collect water or produce mosquito infestation or that creates health or safety hazards;
- (2) Refuse not stored or properly confined and regularly disposed of in a manner approved by the health officer. Proper storage of refuse shall consist of watertight, flytight containers with flytight covers. Disposal of such refuse will be made on a weekly basis or as often as required in order to prevent the creation of a nuisance.
- (3) Salvage material, junk, bulky waste, or other material on residential premises or vacant lots in residential areas, except as provided for in Section 14-155;
- (4) Minor auxiliary or accessory buildings or structures such as privies, sheds, barns, garages, toolhouses, vacant houses or commercial structures which have become so dilapidated and deteriorated as to result in a potential accident hazard, to provide rat harborage, to create an attractive nuisance for children or to be offensive to the senses; and
- (5) Inoperable or abandoned vehicles permitted, parked or stored or left on any private property in the county, unless such vehicle is completely enclosed within a building or unless the

vehicle is so stored or parked on private property in connection with a law when such parking or storing of a vehicle is necessary to the operation of a business or commercial enterprise.

Sec. 19-4. Enforcement and penalties.

- (a) This Article is enforceable under chapter 8. Any code enforcement officer or law enforcement officer being duly authorized and having jurisdiction in the county may issue a uniform complaint and notice to appear to any person violating a county code or resolution of the county, when such code or resolution provides for enforcement by prosecution through county court.
- (b) Violations of this article are punishable as provided for in Section 1-8.
- (c) Violations listed in Section 19-3 are class F violations as described in Section 8-5(a).

Sec. 19-5. Other remedies unaffected.

Nothing in this Article shall be construed to limit or forbid the County or any other person from pursuing any other remedies available at law or in equity to enforce the provisions of this Article.

SECTION 2: EFFECTIVE DATE
