The conference was educational and insightful providing new information on elder justice to be put to use updating the Kansas Support Services for Elders (KSSE) program, a financial management assistance program through Sedgwick County RSVP.
- The 14th Annual Irene Hart Award was presented to Frances Seidl on May 8th in recognition of her significant impact to the community and contributions to the field of aging. Frances, a geriatric nurse, has been a trailblazer in the field of aging since the 1960's. She is an educator and author, advocate for older adults and rural hospitals, and continues to educate the next generation as a substitute instructor at Butler Community College when needed, and active participant with the Sedgwick County Advisory Council on Aging and Physical Disabilities since 2001. Frances was recognized for her significant impact to the field of aging for over 50 years. Her dedication, passion and body of work have greatly impacted



the lives of older adults, caregivers, and professionals in the field as well as strengthened the community at large.

- May was Mental Health Awareness Month They had several COMCARE Community Partners and other events scheduled to celebrate this month for awareness building.
 - COMCARE hosted a viewing of the Kevin Hines Movie The Ripple Effect on Tuesday, April 30th at Risen Savior Lutheran Church located at 6770E. 34th Street. It was a cold and rainy night, but they did have about 70 people attend.
 - o The Mental Health Yard Sale was May 2 May 4, 2019 from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. The community brought forward a lot of donations for the sale and it was a success.
 - Children's Mental Health Day was honored with an Art Show on Saturday, May 18th from 1 3 p.m. at Cowtown in the Empire House Theater. It is a coordinated effort between COMCARE, COMCARE Community Partners and Wichita Public Schools. There were over 150 art items submitted and close to 200 people came to view the art. The Art Director at USD 259 has already said this should be an annual event.
- Sadly, there was a death of a Southeast student earlier in May, and there was a lot of news coverage related to suicide prevention efforts including staff members Tisha Darland and Deidre Manis. Several COMCARE staff participated in interviews and many sought services at Crisis following this event. That and the death by suicide by a 21 year old student at WSU this month has been a real call to action for our community.
- KSN aired a significant segment on the school mental health pilot. Shantel Westbrook and two students were key participants and the story focused on the positive impact of the program.

The way SED waiver cases are managed are changing on July 1, 2019. This has been
creating a lot of concern as there was potential for significant delays in getting Medicaid
eligibility. But, KDHE and KDADs have developed a process to assure that eligibility will
be determined within days rather than months as was probable without their help.

- During the month of May, Sedgwick County Developmental Disability Organization (SCDDO) Quality Assurance Staff completed 10 day and 8 residential program visits.
- Peter Daniels, SCDDO Special Projects Coordinator, and Jeannette Livingston, SCDDO Assistant Director, attended the South Central Kansas Employment First Summit May 3rd. The summit is an opportunity for professionals, employers, job coaches, family/caregivers and people with disabilities to raise awareness and increase opportunities for sustainable, competitive, integrated employment for people with disabilities. Peter also represented the Sedgwick County Business Leadership at the event.
- As part of the SCDDO's capacity development initiatives a video was created to promote direct support work as a rewarding career opportunity under the tagline of "Career of Caring." This initial effort will be fully developed through a contract with an advertising company. In May, proposals were reviewed and Nye & Associates was selected to fully develop a direct support professional media and marketing campaign. The goal of the campaign is to raise awareness in the community of the important work done by direct support professionals and inspire quality candidates to apply for vacant positions. SCDDO will dedicate a page on our website where interested candidates can link to open positions with affiliates.



Health Department*

- Epidemiology:
 - On May 1, two Epidemiology staff attended the Infectious Disease Symposium in Olathe, Kansas. The event was hosted by Johnson County Health and Environment. Staff learned from local, state, and federal partners about highly infectious bacteria and viruses and the response of public health and public safety to highly infectious disease outbreaks.
 - On May 14, Epidemiology staff worked with the Kansas Biological Survey to begin mosquito and West Nile virus monitoring for the summer of 2019. Sedgwick County and other partners are working together to conduct adult mosquito surveillance, control mosquitoes, and communicate Drain, Dress and DEET prevention messages to the public.
- Immunizations: The risk of injury during and after flooding can be high. Flood waters and standing waters pose various risks, including infectious diseases. During the month of May Immunization staff collaborated with the Sedgwick County Fire Department's (SCFD) medical staff to provide Tdap vaccine to first responders. The vaccine was provided by the Kansas Department of Health and Environment's Immunization Program as a disaster relief effort. A total of 83 Sedgwick County First Responders received the vaccine at multiple fire stations.
- <u>Women, Infants and Children (WIC)</u>: 2,655 women, 2,754 infants, and 6,588 children under age five a total of 11,997 enrolled in the SG County WIC program.





Monthly Trends of the Selected Investigations Shown on the Table





