- The Kansas Association of Area Agencies on Aging and Disabilities (k4ad) represents all eleven Area Agencies on Aging (AAA) who coordinate services for older adults and individuals with a disability in all 105 counties of Kansas. Central Plains Area Agency on Aging (CPAAA) hosted the Annual k4ad Director's Retreat for AAA Director's August 7-9, 2019. The retreat was informative focusing on legislative updates, current issues facing AAA's and strategic planning for 2020.
- The AARP Foundation Tax-Aide offers free tax preparation for low-income older adults during the tax season. The Director finalized plans to establish Central Plains Area Agency on Aging (CPAAA) as an AARP Tax-Aide site for the 2019 tax season. In conjunction with AARP, the agency will host tax-aide volunteers IRS certified in tax preparation in February 2020 two days a week for tax preparation for those in need.
- The Team Lead for the Functional Assessment (FAI) Unit attended the National Home and Community Based Services (HCBS) Conference held in Baltimore, MD August 25-29, 2019. As one of the largest conferences for HCBS services, the event

featured policymakers including federal, state, and local government officials as well as those who administer, manage, and deliver waiver and other HCBS programming. The event highlighted changing needs of a growing population and best practices from across the country in home and community-based services.

- During the month of August, Sedgwick County Developmental Disability Organization (SCDDO) Quality Assurance Staff completed 11 day and 10 residential program visits.
- GT Independence joined the network of affiliated providers in Sedgwick County in August. GT is a financial management services (FMS) company that assists individuals to self-direct their services. Specific services offered include enhanced care, overnight respite, and personal care services. As a FMS company, GT Independence provides the administrative tasks allowing the individual receiving services or their guardian to function as employer and supervisor of the direct support worker providing the services.
- On August 23, 2019, Sedgwick County supervisors were introduced to the incoming Project SEARCH interns and new teacher in a meet and greet session. There are seven interns for the 2019/2020 school year with Sedgwick County departments' offering twelve internship opportunities. Participating departments include Department of Corrections, Information and Technology Services, Exploration Place, Tag Office, Print Shop, Department on Aging, Health Department, SCDDO, and Sedgwick County Cafeteria.
- Dee Nighswonger, SCDO Director, completed eight visits during August with affiliates to discuss progress on our strategic focus areas, share about special projects, and receive feedback from our network on our efforts and how we can continue to improve our partnerships.
- On August 20, 2019, the SCDDO welcomed Anisa Jalil, a new MSW practicum student from Wichita State University.

- In partnership with SCDDO and NADD, Wichita State University has developed the NADD Specialty Clinical Certification badge courses. These courses are designed for advanced practitioners who provide clinical services to clients with co-occurring behavioral health needs and intellectual/developmental disability. These courses will help students prepare for future certification through NADD. This fall we launched the following courses: Clinical Assessment, Psychotherapy, and Positive Supports & Environments. Each course is equivalent to 1.0 credit hours or 15 CEU's. Scholarships for the fall semester are available through September 13, 2019. Students may begin courses between August 19, 2019, and November 19, 2019, with all coursework complete by December 5, 2019.
- Disability:IN Greater Wichita completed a two-part Mental Health in the Workplace Lunch & Learn series on August 28, 2019. The first session focused on Mindfulness in the workplace and the series ended with Compassion in the Workplace. Both sessions were taught by Sherilyn Dalke a licensed clinical counselor. Employers learned how mindfulness and compassion play an important role in our daily work life, and how by promoting & using both strategies they can help with employee productivity, loyalty, job satisfaction, as well as help with controlling stress. The Lunch & Learn topics were well received by the participants and several of the business representatives commented that they were planning to take the materials back to present to their managers to start to implement the strategies.
- Disability:IN Greater Wichita also announced the 2019 FORUM, breakout sessions scheduled for October 22, 2019. Sessions will include subjects on Veteran Relations: Filling the Skills Gap, Microsoft Suite Accessibility, ADA & the Interactive Process & Being Intentional: Proactive Approaches to Diversity & Inclusion Efforts. The FORUM will be kicked off with a keynote address from Anne Hirsh the Co-Director of the Job Accommodation Network (JAN). JAN is an internationally recognized authority on ADA accommodations. They have worked with fortune 500 companies as well as small businesses and employees making sure that accommodations are reasonable and attainable for all parties. JAN is also well known in the Human Resources world for hundreds of published articles focused on accommodations. The keynote address will be focused on Tools, Techniques and Technologies for creating Inclusive Workplaces.

## **Health Department\***

• Epidemiology: In August, under the guidance of Epidemiology staff, a KU Master of Public Health student completed data entry and analysis of autopsy information from people who died of suicide in Sedgwick County during 2018. The slides prepared by the intern were presented by Dr. Nicole Klaus, KU Wichita Psychiatry Department, at the Board of County Commissioners meeting on September 4, 2019. Analyzing suicide data helps SCSPC monitor trends and the effect of interventions to decrease the rate of suicide in Sedgwick County.






## Monthly Trends of the Selected Investigations Shown on the Table
