Joni Wilson seconded the motion. The motion passed unanimously.

Questions and Answers

Brent Shelton: The \$71,000.00 is an annual amount and I think the last part of that sentence is if they demonstrate that they will show us how to earn more than their fee then we obligate for one (1) year and subsequent to that is a 30 day cancellation. So if it is not working, we get out in 30 days.

Russell Leeds: Have we used something like this before? Is this the first time?

Brent Shelton: We have not and what we have seen with the financial markets with the way they are taking off and after a period of historic low interest rates that which is getting to be more and more complex, we want to adhere to our investment policy which is based on safety and liquidity and return, and have as much money working as possible. So these folks provide us with algorithms and analytics to say instead of having \$15,000,000.00 in the bank, we only need \$5,000,000.00 right now and put that \$10,000,000.00 to work for the next 90 days. They help us with that sort of analysis.

Russell Leeds: The fee is \$71,000.00 if they can show they can earn us more then is there a buffer there? If we make \$75,000.00 then we have to give them \$71,000.00 of it?

Brent Shelton: The \$71,000.00 is a fee for them to do two things. One (1) is to look at our relationships with our financial institutions so they will look at our banking electronically, analyze historical and future trends and then they will also look at our investment portfolio and push some analytics to that. One of the things right now that is tough for us is a one (1) year return on investments is higher than a four (4) year return. Typically we have invested for four (4) years at a time. Do we continue with that? Do we invest for a year? Do we invest for six (6) months? They are looking at the marketplace with a number of different public institutions as well.

On the recommendation of Jaimee Witmer, on behalf of the Department of Corrections (DOC), Greg Gann moved to accept the proposal from Benchmark Government Solutions, LLC dba Benchmark of Kansas, LLC and establish contract pricing at the rates listed above for a period of three (3) years with two (2) one (1) year options to renew. Tim Myers seconded the motion. The motion passed unanimously.

A committee comprised of Mario Salinas, Stacy Bell, and Emily Allen - Department of Corrections; Jared Schechter - Sheriff's Office; and Jaimee Witmer - Purchasing, evaluated the proposal responses based on the criteria set forth in the RFP. The committee unanimously agreed to accept the proposal from Benchmark Government Solutions, LLC dba Benchmark of Kansas, LLC.

Previously, all meals for Juvenile Detention Facility (JDF), Juvenile Residential Facility (JRF), Ratio and Non-Ratio Staff, Sedgwick County Offender Assessment Program (SCOAP), and the Providing Opportunities While Ending Recidivism (POWER) Program were provided in-house by the food management team at JDF. Due to extreme staffing shortages, DOC has opted to contract this service out. The awarded vendor will work out of an established kitchen, located at JDF, with all appliances, refrigeration, and freezer capacity available. In addition, the vendor selected will be responsible for ordering, receiving, storing, preparing, serving, scullery activities, and ensuring that all requirements for food storage, preparation, and meal delivery follow the Department for Children and Families (DCF) licensing of a secure detention facility and a residential facility. The food services' contract is primarily for youth detained/held in the JDF and youth held in the JRF.

The population identified for the JDF is a capacity of 108 with an Average Daily Population (ADP) of 44 in 2020 and 43 in 2021. In 2019, the population for JRF was a capacity of 24 with ADP of 15 and in 2020 the ADP was 15. JRF is currently licensed for 16 residents. Additional meals will need to be available for Juvenile Intake and Assessment Center (JIAC) and JDF admissions outside of regular meal times. Average additional daily meals outside of regular service hours is seven (7). Ratio staff meals are also required within this contract. The number of daily ratio staff members present during breakfast for JDF is 1, lunch is 15, and dinner is 15, and the number of ratio staff for JRF per meal is typically 2-3. The following optional meal programs are also included in the contract award:

- Non-Ratio Staff and other contracted staff in the facility The number of staff purchasing any meal (breakfast, lunch, or dinner) could range from 0-10.
- SCOAP The meals for SCOAP annually is approximately 21,900 (10,950 lunches and 10,950 dinners).
- Purchased meals for the POWER Program The POWER Program meals will vary; on high end would be 960 meals annually.

Greg Gann: I'm just curious about the timeline upon acceptance of this as to how quickly would they be able to be in place and begin to provide service?

Mario Salinas: The timeline varies anywhere from six (6) to eight (8) weeks depending on the contractor's plate and they would interview our current staff and hire on some new staff.

Russell Leeds: So the condition of the contract to whoever it was awarded to was to basically retain the few staff we have remaining?

Jaimee Witmer: Correct. They also have to pass a background check and other requirements as well. Correct Mario?

Mario Salinas: Yes. They have to do a fingerprint and DCF background check, which takes almost two (2) weeks per employee.

Russell Leeds: You have funding in your existing budget because we're replacing FTEs with a contract service?

Mario Salinas: Yes. So currently we have a cost center specifically for food service that includes actual food as well as personnel expenses. So we would just move money around in that cost center to cover the contract cost.

On the recommendation of Joe Thomas, on behalf of Risk Management, Joni Wilson moved to accept the insurance premium renewals as listed for an estimated total of \$2,589,323.24. Greg Gann seconded the motion. The motion passed unanimously.

The county's property insurance policy has a period of July 1st to June 30th and the premiums are set in June. Sedgwick County continues to work with IMA as our insurance broker to market our insurance portfolio.

The reasons why the premium has increased in recent years:

The county has increased its asset portfolio by making purchases of property and through general property value increases.

The property insurance marketplace has been hardening for the last few years and this trend continues.

The county's five (5) year loss ratio is 135.31% and includes losses from both the hail damage that occurred in 2019 and the fire at the courthouse in 2020, which accounts for \$5,257,586.00.

Questions and Answers

Russell Leeds: What is the cost increase over our last renewal? Do we have any idea?

Elizabeth Wingo: Last year the renewal premium on the property alone was about \$1.6 million so it's about a 50% increase.

Russell Leeds: Pretty significant.

Elizabeth Wingo: Yes.

Russell Leeds: I know we've been talking about for several years as the market continues to harden, I assume that's relative to weather trends and other disasters across the country, property damage from all types of different events that impacts us here as well as other regions in the country.

Elizabeth Wingo: Correct. That does have a big impact on the market.

Russell Leeds: This is the best pricing obviously?

Elizabeth Wingo: Yes it is. The broker brought forth a couple different options and this was the best option.

Russell Leeds: 50% increase is pretty huge but if that's what the market is, that's what the market is. I assume we don't want to be uninsured.

Elizabeth Wingo: That is correct. We do not want to be uninsured while we are still in hail season.

Russell Leeds: We're self insured to extent but this is additional supplemental insurance for unexpected events.

Elizabeth Wingo: Yes, for large scale events.

Russell Leeds: It's really important we have supplemental insurance.

Elizabeth Wingo: Yes.

On the recommendation of Joe Thomas, on behalf of Project Services, Tim Myers moved to accept the bid from Central Consolidated, Inc. in the amount of \$1,945,000.00. Joni Wilson seconded the motion. The motion passed unanimously.

This project consists of replacing three (3) 320 ton stainless steel cooling towers on the roof of the main courthouse. It also includes replacing two (2) structural steel beams to support the new towers; re-working of the water supply, return lines and drain lines; installing water piping insulation; hoisting of towers and beams; testing and balancing; and electrical services.

Notes:

This project was originally approved by BoCC on August 8, 2021. The bond resolution to increase funding for the project was approved by BoCC June 14, 2023.

Questions and Answers

Greg Gann: I'll just ask my usual question. What's the timeline for implementation?

Joe Thomas: The company that bid on it said it would be 261 days to substantial completion and the final would be a total of 275 days.

Greg Gann: So a better part of a year.

Joe Thomas: Yes.

Russell Leeds: Again, this needs to be done because there's structural issues in addition to mechanical failures?

Kendal Ewing: The structural damage on the I-beams, you can actually see through them. They are damaged so bad. That's the issue with those as far as needing to be replaced and support the new cooling towers.

Tim Myers: How old are the cooling towers?

Kendal Ewing: I can't answer that specifically. I believe they were installed in 1988. I don't have that information in front of me.

Russell Leeds: Again this is two (2) parts functional failure of the mechanical and then the structural failure of the beams, which are a safety issue.

Kendal Ewing: Correct. The cooling towers have reached their expected life expectancy and then the structure beams need to be replaced. The cooling towers would have to be removed to replace those beams as well so going with new cooling towers.

Russell Leeds: If we don't replace the beams, the cooling towers are going to collapse.

Kendal Ewing: They could end up through the roof.
