2024 Suicide Rate


- 92 suicide deaths in Sedgwick County.
- 17.97 suicide deaths per 100,000 Sedgwick County residents.







Comparisons with State and National Rates










Suicide Rates per 100,000 by Age










Suicide Rates per 100,000 by Gender










Suicide Rates per 100,000 by Method









Mental Health and Suicide History


- 50% of deaths had known history of mental illness
 - Depression was the most commonly noted mental illness
- 37% of deaths had known history of suicidal ideations
- 15% of deaths had known history of previous suicide attempts
- 30% of deaths had known history of medical illness
- 42% of deaths had known history of substance misuse
 - Illicit drug use was the most commonly noted substance
 - Alcohol misuse was the second most common

Local Suicide Prevention Efforts

- Mental Health First Aid
 - 18 classes taught in 2024 resulting in 280 people trained
 - Spanish trainings added
- Coalition attended 79 public events educating and impacting at least 2996 community members
- All Wichita police trained in evidence-based suicide screening approaches
- Suspenders4Hope Preventing Suicide Training program
 - 49 trainings provided in 2024 resulting in 2,256 people trained
- MHA provided community trainings
 - 2 ASIST trainings
 - 3 CALM trainings resulting in 38 people trained
 - 5 QPR trainings resulting in 64 people trained
 - 28 mental health presentations reaching 584 community members
- Zero Reasons Why implemented in 17 schools in the Wichita metro area
 - Trained 74 teen ambassadors trained in 2024
- Survivors of Suicide Loss Day provided support for loss survivors in the community







Local Suicide Prevention Efforts

- WSU Community Engagement Institute provided a virtual webinar and online learning session, Caring Across Cultures: Suicide Prevention Readiness Training project
 - Partnership with KDADS, funded by and supported by SAMHSA and NASMHPD
 - 12 sessions presented, with 487 live participants and 419 online views of recordings
- Range 54 is participating in the Hold My Guns program
- Sedgwick County Suicide Prevention Coalition sponsored a training on *Building a Life Worth Living: Expanding DBT for Intervention and Prevention* at the 2024 Kansas Prevention Conference
 - 6 hours of training offered for up to 50 participants
- 988 regional group expanding reach through 2025 state fair





Community Mental Health Initiatives

- Kansas Behavioral Health Center for Excellence
 - Collaborative effort to address behavioral health care workforce shortages in Kansas through educational initiatives
- South Central Regional Psychiatric Hospital
 - Slated to begin providing services in 2027
- Breaking ground this year on new COMCARE Community Crisis Center, which will expand access to crisis services







Know the Signs

- TALK: No reason to live. Feeling trapped. Feeling like a burden to others. Unbearable pain. Talk of killing themselves.
- BEHAVIOR: Increased alcohol/drug use. Isolation from family and friends. Sleeping too little/too much. Withdrawing from activities. Seeking access to pills/weapons or other means.
- MOOD: Depression. Loss of interest. Rage. Irritability. Humiliation. Anxiety.







What can you do?

- Take it seriously, if someone mentions suicide.
- Talk openly and matter-of-factly about suicide.
- Be willing to listen. Allow expressions of feelings. Accept the feelings.
- Offer hope that help is available.
- Do not leave him or her alone.
- Get help immediately!
